Sharing our Interest in the Kimball Family Silversmiths

Several years ago, we discovered some Kimball hallmarked silverware in among many other pieces of sterling that we had inherited and that we received as wedding gifts. At that time, we were unaware that members of our family had been silversmiths in Boston until the 1930's.

We Asked around from other Kimball family members what they knew and with one exception no one was aware of the Kimball silversmith business. That distant relative from Concord New Hampshire had several Kimball family silver pieces as well as a number of tables and chests made in the 1800's by her family.

This started us to investigate the Boston libraries achieves and to our delight there were several references to Kimball family members who were listed in the business directories under silversmiths and jewelers. There is also a directory of Silver marks and Hallmarks in the Boston Public Library which listed Kimball hallmarked silver for over 200 years from 20 firms. In addition, we discovered a Lewis Kimball crafted sterling vase in in the collection of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston.

We contacted some antique dealers and checked on auction sites and over the last 10 years have added 30 pieces to our original modest collection. Today we have coin silver and sterling silver pieces from 18 different Kimball owned firms dating from the last 1700's to the 1930's.

This is how we got hooked on collecting Kimball silver pieces.

A Short History of the Daniel KIMBLE Family of Northwestern Ohio

In the late 1970's my father's oldest sister, "Dosia", while recovering from a stroke, wrote a very short genealogy booklet on the Kimble family in Northwestern Ohio. Aunt Dosia did most of her research through letter writing to cousins who were still alive, the library, an archive or two, from her memory and family papers, writing it all on a typewriter.

The information in it was interesting, written in a rather confusing outline of grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, etc., some of them I had met as a child and a lot of whom I had never heard.

There were birth dates, death dates and some marriage dates included. On every page or so were a few old family photos. I had heard a few family stories when my dad, Robert, the baby of his family and his nearest in age, brother, "Uncle Ralph" and sister, "Aunt Gladys" would get together on occasion and go in to fits of hysterical laughter while talking about their childhoods and their relatives. I can relate to that, as it's exactly the same thing that I experience with my own brothers and sisters on the rare times when we get together.

Aunt Dosia's booklet started with my Great-great Grandfather, Daniel Kimble, who came as a young man with three of his brothers, William, John Horton and Gustavis from Rochester Territory in New York State to Northwestern Ohio in the late 1820's, when it was a wilderness called the Northwest Territory. Gustavis drowned in Lake Michigan, William was lost to his brothers somewhere in the Michigan wilderness and John Horton settled in Michigan. Daniel settled in Northwestern Ohio, became a farmer, known in the area for making the first wooden auger for boring wells. He married Luticia Eutser in Athens, Ohio in 1829 and settled on land that he purchased in 1837 from the government, paying cash for 211.36 acres.

I was puzzled that Aunt Dosia made no mention in her genealogy booklet about Daniel's father and mother. Years later, in 2005, I decided to start my own search for Daniel Kimble's father. All I had to go on was a line in Aunt Dosia's booklet about his going with three brothers, John, Gustavis and William from their home in Rochester Territory New York to the Northwest Territory (Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois). I got on the computer and tried to look up anything I could find on the Kimble family in Rochester Territory. I kept coming up with a Jacob Kimball. There were no Kimbles listed anywhere. I gave up.

I joined Ancestry.com and Archives.com. I fiddled around, filling in stuff that I had gleaned from Aunt Dosia's booklet. After all, I actually knew my immediate aunts, uncles and cousins. I was building quite a tree but still got hung up on finding Daniel Kimble's parents. Then one day, I got a "hint leaf" on Ancestry.com. All it said was "Daniel Kimble, born 1801, Virginia". I couldn't find anything else; so, I decided to look in the Virginia State Archives. I found him! Daniel Kimble was the only Daniel Kimble born in Virginia in 1801. From there I got a listing of his parents, William Kimble and step-mother Rachael Vaughn (1772-1848) and siblings. William was married first to Hannah Skinner (1790-1850). I think that they were divorced because she died two years after Rachael. William's father, was Jacob Kimball. I have no idea why William spelled his last name differently; but, from Jacob Kimball, I was able to trace my paternal line all the way back to Richard Kimball of the historical voyage of "The Ship Elizabeth".

That led me to a genealogy site in England which took the family even further back. Our surname has changed its spelling a few times over the centuries: Kymbold/Kembold/Kimball/Kimble...and there are probably a few more variations. However, the family appears to

have all come from around Suffolk, County, England. Richard Kimball came from Rattlesden, Suffolk, Co., England. My sisters, Barbara Kimble-Finck MD and Carole Kimble-Barksdale RN and I visited Rattlesden in 2015. There wasn't a Kimball/Kimble to be found although the villagers there are very fond of the American Kimball/Kimble families that come to visit!

In my family search, I found that Jacob Kimball and his father, Jacob Kimball, Sr. both fought in the American Revolutionary War. Daniel Kimble's sons, William, Enos, Benjamin and Henry all fought for

the Union Army during the American Civil War. Henry Kimble's grandsons, Franklin Olin and Harley Ervin served in the Army during World War I. During World War II, Harley Ervin (Army), Charles Wesley (Air Force), Henry Ralph (Navy) and Robert Walter (Army) each served in the Medical Corps of their service branch.

While he, his children and grandchildren were mostly farmers and farmer's wives, their children had other interests. Daniel Kimble's grandson, William Harley Kimble's children: Franklin Olin Kimble DDS, Sarah Theodosia Kimble RN, Harley Ervin Kimble MD, Charles Wesley Kimble DDS, Corda Gladys Kimble-MacRae RN, Henry Ralph Kimble DDS and Robert Walter Kimble DDS gave over a total of 300 years of service to aid the health of others. His great-great and great-great-great grandchildren have also become doctors, nurses, scientists, engineers, educators, business people, artists, woodworkers and I am sure there are still some farmers.

I discovered the KFA site on the internet in 2016. Of course, I had to share that with my sisters and brothers. My sisters and I have joined. My brothers have their applications. This past August, 2017, my sisters, Barbara Kimble-Finck MD, Carole Kimble-Barksdale RN and I attended the KFA Reunion in Nashua, New Hampshire. We had a terrific time meeting all of our new cousins. Before the reunion, we found the street corner (Appleton St. and Huron Ave.) in Watertown, Mass where Richard Kimball had his first farm, found an old cemetery where a John Kimball is buried (I'm not sure how he's related) and checked out the amazing research room at the library. After the reunion, we made a trip to the Kimball Farm where we ate some amazing ice cream, saw the interesting array of small farm animals including a peacock, enjoyed the gift shop and took a lot of pictures. It was a fun trip!

I am currently working on a more detailed genealogy of the Kimble side of my family to submit for the next volumes of the Kimble history. ~
